

Choosing Christmas Again

Matthew, Luke, and John all begin patiently. One gives us the lineage of Jesus. One tells us about Jesus' aunt and uncle. One plunges us into the great mysteries of time and being. Groundwork is laid. A story takes shape.

Mark, though, has no time for such things. We hear him shout out the sheer joy of it: "*The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.*" He's a kid at Christmas: so busy tearing the wrapping off of a new reality he can't even be bothered to put a verb in his sentence. Mark dropped his "good news" into a world gone numb and dark. Political oppression, religious opposition, social violence, cultural indifference, and economic suppression terrorized the times. Hope seemed hopeless – the figment of ancient dreamers. That's what makes Mark's news so exciting. And in the face of all this, the boldness of his proclamation divided hearers along clear lines. It forced a choice: cynicism or celebration? capitulation or. . . *Christmas*?

Some say now – as some did then – that this good news was just a magical tale, that Christmas is a mere fable born of wishful dreams. In face of all this, Christians are still called to <u>choose</u> –to choose the story that will give shape to their seeing and being.

The facts are these:

- Yes, it's a holiday wrapped in folklore lowing cattle, straw-filled mangers, and wonder of all wonders a silent baby.
- But on a far more truthful level, it's also an epiphany swathed in mystery and wonder, awe and grace, and the love and promise of God.

This Advent Season, once more, the choice is before us: we can choose to join a world that continues to shrink in postpandemic lethargy, or we can choose to join Mark in his broadening exuberance and tear open the wrapping of new life.

You see, if Mark's was just <u>the beginning</u> of the good news of Jesus Christ, then there's still more to come. And, who knows, maybe the advent of that good news that's yet emerging requires nothing more than you and me and him and her... singing, and praying, and embracing, and hoping... and **choosing Christmas**. Again.

Come. Let us adore him,


New Christmas Tradition

Fountain Hills Crisis Response Team

The Mission Committee at FHPC was fortunate to have 2 members from the Fountain Hills Crisis Response Team

speak to us about their work in the community at one of our meetings. They are an important asset to our community.

Teamed with the Fire Department and Sheriff's office, The Crisis Response Team members are trained volunteers dedicated to providing immediate crisis intervention and on-scene emotional support during and after a traumatic event.

The volunteers help at the scene of a sudden death, traffic accident, fires, or other incidents. The two-person team focuses on the emotional and social needs of the

person or family while the emergency personnel attend to their assignments. Crisis Team calls can range from minutes to hours depending on the situation. It is such a valuable outreach program to the community in Fountain Hills.

The Mission Committee donated \$500 in gift cards to help these wonderful volunteers support families in need at the time of a crisis. It might be providing a meal or some groceries, a stuffed animal for a child during a traumatic event,

or other immediate needs. The Crisis Response Team has no budget so this support from FHPC was greatly appreciated.

Library Footnotes

The Elephant Whisperer By Lawrence Anthony

What a delight and refreshing change for me to read and review this book. It is primarily about wild animals in Africa

and in a most painless and thrilling way we get a great education. The background: Lawrence Anthony is English and retains class ties to England but he and his family have lived in South Africa, Zululand, for generations. He is a fervent conservationist working with various Zulu clans to protect and even increase endangered species, but in addition, add greatly to their economy.


This is also a great love story of an unlikely pairing that became a most wonderful partnership of idealism, devotion, resilience and also very hard work, faith and hope. But enough of humans, our main story is mostly about elephants

and we also read about the great affection and respect that Anthony Lawrence has for all animals, even hyenas and their place and value in creation and the balance of nature. This is such eye-opening as well as pleasurable reading. It really makes us think!

In 1999 Anthony and his elegant Parisian wife obtained a 5000 acre hunting ranch, Zhula Zhula, and he vowed the elephants would never be killed by these hunters again. It was to become a reserve where animals would be left alone, born free and remain free. He felt that the best cage was an empty one and money would eventually come from tourists.

Zhula Zhula has a great problem which many other reserves have—poachers. The very first chapter of this book opens in a very dramatic way. Gunshots are heard and animals are being killed. Anthony and his ranger hop into their Land Rover with their guns and head into the direction of the shots. No one there! Then gunshots are heard in the opposite direction. They head in that direction. Too late. Two large animals have been killed and butchered establishing a very well organized plot, indeed mystery, and we are immediately "hooked". Poaching has been an ongoing and critical problem but it pales in comparison to the problems Anthony had when he agreed to accept a herd of wild elephants who would all be shot, all nine of them, including babies if he did not accept them.

There had been no elephants in Zululand for so many years that no one ever remembered seeing them. After conferring with his wife and staff and taking into considera-



tion all of the preparation and possible problems and not wanting them to be killed, he decided to take the chance. A whole herd of nine given to him! Free! How-

> ever, before they arrived, the matriarch, (considered a particular problem), and her baby were killed.

> So the journey begins, there is crisis after crisis. This is a very traumatized wild herd which is headed by a very clever matriarch who had managed to break out of every enclosure. The lives of nearby villagers were endangered. How Anthony finally managed to connect with them and gain their trust and affection (and he also gains great affection for them) make fascinating reading.

> There are many other stories that also capture our attention including, the description of the

African terrain in all seasons and the description of the Zulu clans and their way of life. There is great wisdom along with great superstition, a most interesting mix.

It is touching, as well as beautiful, to read how the elephant herd deals with a newborn, always a joy to them, is born with such deformed feet that it cannot stand. What nobility they showed. Also, it is fascinating to read how elephants cherish and care for the very aged who have lost their teeth and are dying of starvation. "Humanity" to the fullest.

This book is constantly packed with exciting moments—not a single one boring. To increase income, the Anthonys built housing for guests who wanted the experience of their lives in the African bush. At one time Anthony went to Iraq during the war with them and found accommodations for the animals in the Baghdad Zoo. They also were victims of war.

This autobiography comes to an end because

Lawrence Anthony died in 2012. What a wonderful legacy he has left. Anyone reading this book will be so glad to have had the opportunity to learn so much and also so much that is positive; just what we need in the world of today.





In December 2017, Jimmy Amisial, a Texas State student home in Haiti on break, noticed a crowd peering into a trash can. A 4-month-old infant lay inside, but no one moved. So Amisial scooped up the baby and took him home to his mom. They washed and clothed him, gave him milk and sought medical care. After investigators failed to locate parents, a judge asked if Amisial would serve as legal guardian. Sensing "this had happened for a reason," he "took a leap of faith." Now Amisial is raising funds to adopt Emilio. "I'm glad I got the opportunity to transform his life from being abandoned in the trash to being a wonderful treasure," he says.

Likewise, God did not leave humankind trapped amid the trash of sin and evil, destruction and death. Instead, God came to us as Jesus, scooped us into his loving arms and claimed us as his own. Like Emilio, we've been transformed and are treasured.

Come as you are

If you sometimes have a "love-hate" attitude toward Christmas, you're not alone. Theologian Charles Spurgeon bemoaned the "gluttony and drunkenness" that often marked the holiday in 19th-century England. "If there be any day in the year of which we may be pretty sure that it was not the day on which the Savior was born," he said, "it is the 25th of December." Yet Spurgeon also wished "there were 20 Christmas Days in the year," because Christ's birth represents "supreme joy." In his writings and sermons, Spurgeon urges people to honor Jesus' birthday "all year round," reminding them that they can come "just as you are" because "no forms of etiquette are required in entering a stable." God offers everyone total acceptance, Spurgeon adds, "for he puts himself into that manger that you may approach him."

The Amazon rain forest produces more than 20% of the world's oxygen supply

The Amazon River pushes so much water into the Atlantic Ocean that, more than one hundred miles at sea off the mouth of the river, one can dip fresh water out of the ocean. The upside-down of Christmas

Theologian Halford Luccock once saw a shopper "who looked like an animated Christmas tree with packages dangling from every limb." When he retrieved some dropped bags, she grumbled that Christmas "turns everything upside down." Luccock replied, "That is just what it was made for!"

He explained: "Christmas is a story about a baby, and that is a baby's chief business, turning things upside down. ... A baby in a family divides time into two eras, just as Christmas does. There is B.C., which means 'before child,' and A.D., which means 'after deluge."

When God became flesh, the lowly, last, least and lost were exalted, added Luccock. As a result, "the lockedup treasures of kindliness and sympathy come from the inside of the heart, where they are often kept imprisoned, to the outside of actual expression in deed and word." The Christ-child "enables all [people] to get at the best treasures of their lives and offer them for use."
