Pastor Bill worked with the Presbytery to invite me to come along beside him for the last few months as he prepared to retire and move his ministry to the university campus. His desire, and both the Session and Presbytery concurred, was that I would then become the Transitional Pastor.

I am a graduate of Ohio Christian University, Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, and Ashland Theological Seminary in Ohio. During a period of five years in the early 90's, I was also an adjunct professor in a theological seminary in addition to continuing to serve my congregation as senior pastor. I had the opportunity to leave the pastorate and become a professor full time at the seminary but just could not think of doing anything else except being the pastor God called me to be. I served for eight months as Transitional Pastor in one of our ECO Churches in Tempe during 2021. And now, I'm back at it one more time. Serving you

and the Fountain Hills community is my highest privilege. Old preachers are like a bad cold, they just don't go away easily! I look forward to serving beside our elders and deacons as we begin the next thrilling chapter in the life of the FH Presbyterian Church. I honestly believe our Lord has great things in store for us as we strive to love, honor, and serve Jesus Christ together. My passion is to see the church become a growing, vibrant, united, community of faith that is Christ centered, biblically based, and faithful to our Reformed theological heritage. To accomplish this, we will strive to keep our eyes on Jesus and follow Him wherever He takes us! If you want to know what my primary emphasis will be as I serve among you, here it is: "For I have decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ and him crucified" (1 Cor. 2:2). 
There will be baskets at each door for anyone who wants to donate to the "Dinner Out" program.

Water

As a reminder, we collect cases of Bottled Water for the homeless in downtown Phoenix. This has been a longtime project for us. We really push hard in the summer months when dehydration can occur so easily. But we still collect in winter months also. You can leave them in the Church office or place them in by the grocery cart on Sunday mornings.

Haiti

We continue to support Pwoje Espwa (Project Hope) in Haiti through Overture International, formerly Free The Kids, Inc. The project was originally an orphanage but over the last five years has evolved into a family reintegration and child development program similar to foster care in the U.S. Last year the president of Haiti was assassinated, and the country collapsed into anarchy. Today Haiti is a tinderbox under constant threat of rioting and violence.

In 2015 we were introduced to this project by Jack Reynolds and his brother-in-law Father Marc, who founded Pwoje Espwa and he has been involved for over 20 years. Because of the turbulent situation, many wellknown organizations have left the country. But the skilled Haitian management at Espwa that has been mentored by Overture personnel for many years, continues their mission offering support to over 1,000 families in the hard-to-reach rural villages in western Haiti. Additionally, Espwa operates a school system with 1200 students K-12. Espwa has over 200 employees from the area running this facility. For more info visit: **www.overture.international**

Thank you so much to one and all who were willing to take some of their time to write their personal thoughts of the holidays to our military.

The second part of our holiday ministry at this time of year is the collection of, or the purchase of, items for military members who are deployed. Items purchased by the Committee along with some donated items included long sleeved, dark colored t-shirts, socks, sweatshirts, toiletries and some snacks. These items were then taken to Packages From Home who then does the sorting, packaging and shipping and I was very happy that the Mission Committee was able to donate some funds toward the shipping costs. They were very happy to see me again this year and I want to thank Sandra Coultrap for keeping me company on the long trek to and from Glendale.

The third part of our holiday ministry is the collection of donations for our local Veterans, especially this time of year when the weather is cold and not very comfortable for the homeless. With the amount of donations being way down from our usual amount throughout the year, I was unable to schedule a pick-up from CBI in December but hopefully I can do so by mid to late January. Gently used clothing items are really needed along with jackets, bedding, and toiletries. Please take notice that our collection box is now located on the east side of the Narthex instead of in the front where you would see it as you entered through the front doors. Please place any donations in the container when able.

Again, thank-you to one and all who have stepped forward to help make this particular Mission Committee project a success. The Mission Committee is always happy to find donations in our collection box in the Narthex or in the Church office (gently used clothing, bed-

ding, socks, t-shirts, jackets, shirts and toiletries). Thank you again for remembering our Veterans and our Troops.


Library Footnotes

A Gentle Answer: Our "Secret Weapon" in an Age of Us Against Them, by Scott Sauls

This is such a timely book! Emotions are running high in this country, and no matter which "side" we are on, we want to know that we are best representing Christ when we discuss current issues with others. Now is a perfect opportunity for Christians to be examples of how to love those who don't agree with them. Jesus didn't separate people into piles labeled "good" or "bad," nor should we see others in terms of "us" or "them."

As we live in a world divided on so many issues, how can we, as Christians, best respond? Being a Christian certainly does not mean keeping your mouth shut for the sake of keeping peace. You

have opinions, and your opinions matter. Some differences of opinion can disappoint us and even lead to anger. We are expected to get angry from time to time, and this book reminds us that Christ used to get angry too.



(After all, wasn't Christ the one flipping tables in the synagogue?) This book teaches by example. The author gives numerous examples of how Jesus responded

> in various situations, offering grace to those who seemed least deserving. He also gives examples of people today and throughout our history extending that same grace to others.

I highly recommend this book and can say that it has changed my way of thinking. It made

me realize that to think and live in any way other than the way Jesus taught makes me just another hypocrite, and now I have many fresh examples to draw

from as well as the Scripture to support them.





Presby Pickins' Flea Market has grown month after month! In October we saw bookings at about 50% of our 50 available spaces with temperatures rising to 95 degrees! As the temps cooled down, news of our Market heated up and spread throughout the Fountain Hills community. In November and December, we were thrilled to have all our spaces booked and have our campus bustling with shoppers. Even with the rain forcing us to close down early on December 3rd, our vendors reported great results.



Rentals of spaces and tables/ chairs, along with sales of donated items and Arlene's Sweet Treats, rendered a GROSS income of \$6,305. These funds collected October through December are held in a FHPC reserve account from which expenses and donations are paid. At the end of December, the balance was \$4,554.

Proceeds Support Ministries

The primary mission of Presby Pickins' Flea Market is to sup-



port our church ministries by funding new or unexpected small projects and initiatives outside their expense budgets. The maximum award value is \$250 and any FHPC ministry may apply. Request for Funds Forms are located in the office in the "Presby Pickins" mailbox.

It takes a village to pull such an event off. Thanks go out to all our amazing volunteers! From pricing and sorting, pre-dawn set-up, sales, and clean-up at end-of-day, plus, our congregation has stepped up to support the Flea Market in other ways, such as — item donations, cash donations, to purchasing vendor spots and baking.

Time for a spiritual assessment

"Hardly anything else reveals so well the fear and uncertainty among [people] as the length to which they will go to hide their true selves from each other and even from their own eyes," says A.W. Tozer. For insights into who we really are as Christians, the theologian proposes "rules for self-discovery." According to Tozer, "we may be known" by these seven things: what we want most, what we think about most, how we use our money, what we do with our leisure time, the company we enjoy, who and what we admire, and what we laugh at.

The "wise Christian" will find other tests, says Tozer, but these are a starting point to reveal if our desires and priorities conflict with God's will. "Our self-judgment is almost certain to be biased and imperfect," he adds, yet there's "every good reason for us to work along with the Holy Spirit in his benign effort to locate us spiritually in order that we may make such amendments as the circumstances demand."

On January 6 Christians celebrate Epiphany, when the Magi came to worship baby Jesus. Epiphany, which means an appearance or manifestation, symbolizes the first recognition of the Savior by non-Jews. Because Epiphany also is a reminder that Jesus came as the light of the whole world, its symbols include light, candles and a star.

How did the wise men know — and how do we know — that Jesus is the light of the world? As preacher George Buttrick said, "It would little avail to ask how we know. That would be like asking how we know that Beethoven's 'Hymn to Joy' is joyous. If a man were to say, 'It is not joyous to me,' he would not condemn the music; he would tell only his morbidness. There is no logic to establish an axiom, for an axiom is the basis of all logic; and the soul of Jesus has axiomatic truth. Jesus is light, and there is no proof for light except light itself."
