

We are praising God with trumpet, harp, lyre, stringed instruments and pipe as in Psalm We move our music toward 150:3-4. lifting the emotions of the heart, whether suffering or cheerful as in James 5:13. We are learning scriptures and spiritual truths, as we are instructed in the ways we should go, as in Psalm 32:7-8. We are encouraging each other as in Ephesians 5:18-19. We are also trying to introduce others to Christ as in Psalm 40:3 "and He put a new song in my mouth, a song of praise to our God; many will see and fear, and will trust in the Lord."

Our church is ready! We have God to pray to, to cry to, and to praise each moment in a unified prayer of thanks. Here we go!

I don't want the robe to become a major issue of concern to any of us, but I wanted to let you know my thoughts and welcome



your input. However, I do wear the robe regardless for all Memorial/Funeral Services, baptisms, and weddings since these are always very special and sacred events.

What a difference a year makes! In January 2022 I embarked on a weekend getaway with my adult daughter from our home in Seattle, WA to Scottsdale, AZ. The time with my daughter was especially sweet, and it was on that trip that the Lord unexpectedly cleared the proverbial fog on an issue of which I'd been seeking clarity.

At the beginning of last year, at the urging of and in coopera-

tion with my church leaders, I was concluding a year of discernment about whether to pursue formal ordained ministry. During the year of discernment, pursuing ordained ministry seemed clear, but what was unclear was the sensing that God might be calling me out of Seattle; I had no idea where I would be going.

Well, with immense joy, here I am! (Feel free to ask me the in-between details). I moved to Scottsdale in June 2022, already connected to an ECO church in the area, and was encouraged to pursue ordained ministry here.

For the last five years, I have been working as a full-time (non-ordained) pastoral counselor. I received my Master of Arts in Counseling from Westminster Theological Seminary in Philadelphia. I have been working with churches and individuals primarily in the Seattle area, specializing in churches experiencing significant transitions, both good and hard, by assisting church leaders and caring for individuals.

When I learned of the possibility of interning at Fountain Hills Presbyterian, during a season of transition, I was excited by the opportunity. My passion is Jesus and helping others keep their eyes and hearts oriented toward Him when the things of life are uncertain. Transition, change, and uncertainty are true for us daily and create environments the enemy earnestly uses to distract.

In John 15 Jesus exhorts us, likening the church to branches, that we must actively remain or abide in the vine (Jesus). Our only source of nourishment, thriving, flourishing, and fruit-bearing is dwelling within the vine itself, and loving one another as he has loved us. This is my hope for you over the course of this year... that the ministry of Fountain Hills will be filled with the love, compassion, generosity, humility, and grace of Christ and be actively demonstrated among this church and in the surrounding community.



It is such a privilege to be able to serve among you in this season. I look forward to meeting you in a more personal way, spending time with you in visitation, working alongside Pastor Bob, and worshiping with the community of Fountain Hills Presbyterian. I eagerly anticipate the occasions that I will bring God's Word in preaching and teaching, and the many other opportunities the Lord gives me to serve and fellowship among you.



Mission Ministry



Now that we are officially into the New Year, I want to say a BIG THANK YOU to all who helped us with our Mission Projects. I want to give you a brief recount of our Projects in 2022.

We helped with these 19 projects:

- Extended Hands-with both food and cash money.
- Code Red Water Drive-with both cases of water and cash donations of \$1668.30.
- Devereux Easter Baskets-\$1350.00 this in 54 baskets @\$25.00 each
- Ukraine/Sister City with cash donations of \$5025.81.
- Haiti-\$1000.00
- **Streetlight**-is a joint effort with the Evening Women's Circle, a total of \$2026.33 was collected.
- Blankets Plus/Church World Services-a total of \$2207.66 was collected.
- **Phoenix Rescue**-\$500.00 plus money given in John Bivens name for another \$1597.66.
- Mattress Plus-a total of \$376.72 in coins collected.
- **Boys and Girls Club**-\$1000.00 given for scholarships for the needy kids.
- Here We Grow-\$1000.00 for scholarships for those needy kids.
- Foster Your Future-\$500.00 for helping the youth who have aged out of the Foster System and possibly living on the streets.
- **Good Samaritans Purse**-helping those in Kentucky with \$620.00 and with \$393.25 for Hurricane Ian.
- Fountain Hills PTA-\$500.00
- Vets-\$2025.00
- Fountain Hills Crisis Team-\$500.00
- Christmas Shoe Box Ministries- \$3627.49 in money and some boxes.
- Santa for Seniors-this in conjunction with the Afternoon Women's Circle.
- Caleb and Summer-\$500.00 to help with their Missionary work.

All of this was done with \$6000.00 from the Mission Budget and \$5000.00 given to us from the Rummage Sale money. The rest was given by our generous giving church family. Thank You!


Vets

- Sending out overdue book reminders


Most of the duties involved in maintaining and developing our Library are easy to learn with a little practice and are quite flexible timewise. They can be done at your conven-


Join the Women's Fellowship in learning about the newest building project in Fountain Hills.

God's peaceable kingdom

Once in a while — too seldom, it seems, but often enough to give us hope — Isaiah's prophecy comes true: "The wolf shall live with the lamb, the leopard shall lie down with the kid, the calf and the lion will feed together ... The cow and the bear shall graze, their young shall lie down together" (Isaiah 11:6-7, NRSV).

In February 2022, a Minnesota photographer captured a rare event: a wolf and a deer lying feet from each other in the snow — and neither was eating the other! Occasionally we hear of Palestinians and Israelis partnering to teach peacemaking skills, a rally protester helping an injured counter-protester, a crime victim and perpetrator embracing. A divorced couple I know, deeply estranged, decided they could sit together at their son's high school graduation to demonstrate their love for him.

In a world sadly torn apart, glimpses of mending, tolerance and love are signs of God among us. Isaiah (11:6) declares what makes such goodness possible: "A little child shall lead them." We know this child as the babe of Bethlehem, Jesus.

General Background:

Born in rural Elgin, Illinois...about a thousand years ago. Farm boy during growing up years. Education in a one room country school. Played football in high school.

Roy grew up with music, and a piano playing mother....where many sing-a-longs prevailed on a daily basis. By the 3rd grade he wanted to play a trumpet, and took private lessons. By the 7th grade he was playing trumpet in school.

He started singing in his youth choir at church where his mother was director. He played trumpet throughout the rest of his education...Junior High...High School...and all of college where he received his Bachelor's degree from Northern Illinois University in Dekalb, Il.

Staying with music...he got his first teaching job in Flanagan, IL...where he met his wife, Mary Ann. He was the only music teacher in Flanagan, and therefore taught all general music, band and choruses. After 3 years he returned to Northern Illinois University and earned his Master's degree in 1966. The majority of his teaching years were spent with bands...5th grade beginners through high school. His "middle thirteen years" in education was as District Coordinator for Music and Art....a department of 44 teachers. In total he was involved with music in Illinois schools for 32 years.

After he and Mary Ann discovered Fountain Hills, they took early retirement...and in 1996 joined FHPC. He was one of the founders of Fountain Hills Community Band, and served on the Fountain Hills Public Arts Committee for 12 years. He headed up the "Fount Rushmore Presidents Display" in FH Park. (2015...had no idea you did that)



A favorite saying of his is: "Those who play together, stay together". (All the information above is thanks to Roy Nickel and Pat Willigrod.)



Questions & Answers concerning the biography. Church member Jay Moyer asked Roy a few questions about his musical history, and the FHPC Choir. (Obviously Mr. Moyer lacks some polish when it comes to...certain inquisitive skills and musical knowledge)



Q: Did your parents encourage you to enter music as a vocation? Roy: No.

Q: Did they suggest you take up farming?...or to join a circus?

Roy: No and no.

Q: In other words were you positively influenced by your parents' musical interests...and decided that was what you wanted to do?

Roy: No...I did not realize a direction toward Music education until my senior year in High School.

I was greatly influenced by the H.S. band director and a number of my classmates. Out of a class of 425...about 5 of us went on to become music educators.

Q: Was playing a trumpet in the 3rd grade your idea....or your parents?

Roy: It was totally my idea and my parents supported me.

Q: Why did you pick the trumpet and not the banjo, or base drum? Perhaps the kazoo or harmonica?(Roy explained to me that "base" is spelled "bass". I should have said: "percussion instrument".)Roy: I do wish I had taken piano lessons more seriously. It's probably the greatest instrument for all settings.

Q: Did you play in a symphonic band and/or regular orchestra? Dance band?

Roy: Played in symphonic band and orchestra through out my College years. Through the 1960's also played in big bands (Jazz, Stage, Dance) but not much since then. In my later years, the Fountain Hills Community Band was formed and was very important.

Q: Did you march in a school band and/or become a drum major?

Roy: Marching band was in my life, not my favorite, but necessary. Through the years, conducting groups was very enjoyable. Still is.

Q: Did you perform on stage with famous musical personalities? (Such as: Gene Autry, Roy Rogers, "Rex O'Herlihan the singing Cowboy" (From movie Rustlers Rapsody))

Roy: Not that I know of...thanks for asking.

Q: In the choir, do you consider yourself a soprano, alto,

tenor, or bass? Or perhaps all four? Roy: How much musical training did you say you had?

Bass.

Q: Were you gifted with "perfect pitch" (sometimes called absolute pitch) like Amadeus Mozart or Whitney Houston? Roy: Are you serious?

Q: Did you win a lot of musical recitals... taking home ribbons, medals, trophies, or plaques?

Roy: Next question.

Q: Do people ask you for your autograph? Roy: None recently, if you want one I will provide.

Q: Were you "inspired" by a particular musical scholar, or professional band leader, or orchestra conductor? On the other hand...was there a musical conductor or director that you would like to see thrown into Lake Mead?

Roy: Not sure how to.....

Q: Who was your favorite director, conductor or composer? (Examples: George Solti, Anton Dvorak, Bob Dylan?)

Roy: Who are those guys?

Q: Who is/was your favorite musician? (Examples: Winton Marsalis, Tiny Tim, Boris Karloff) Roy: Are you all they could find to do this interview?

Q: What was/is your favorite kind of music? (Examples: Rap, Jazz, Folk, Classical, Opera.) Roy: Listened to the big bands of Les Brown, Count Basie, Stan Kenton for hours on end. Also liked Maynard Ferguson (trumpet). Also liked folk, classical, jazz, Patriotic songs...all of 'em. Also some Country, and Dixie.

Q: Who was/is your favorite performer(s) ? ((Examples: Linda Ronstadt, Fats Waller, Lady GaGa) Roy: Ray Charles ("America the Beautiful"). Louie Armstrong ("It's a Beautiful World"). The Texas Tenors. Canadian Brass. US Military Bands.

Q: What is your favorite choral piece. (Mine was "Zippi-De-Do-Da".)

Roy: Handel's Messiah is fine. Choral and Instrumental.



Q: Did you ever sing in musicals like "The Sound of Music" or "HMS Pinafore"?

Roy: Played in pit orchestras, never sang.

Q: Did you ever compose...or want to compose music? (What kind?....Acid rock, Classical, Heavy Metal?) Roy: Only in my masters degree days.

Q: Have you made CD's or tapes of your favorite music and put them together in one CD or tape?

Roy: Not recently.....next question?

Q: Do you have a favorite trumpet solo piece?

(Examples: Haydn E-Flat Major Concerto for Trumpet; Leopold Mozart Concerto in D Major; or Louie Armstrong playing anything.)

Roy: I think the last one. Can I go now?

Inquiring minds need to know this stuff. Thanks to Roy for participating...I know there's a ton more information about his background, but it would probably take a book to fill in. And possibly better worded questions.
