He went on to tell us that this Church's main goal was to teach God's word as well as practice it. He had such a wonderful way of making us feel welcomed. At the end of this first class, I was convinced this was to be my new home.

I have enjoyed all of the Pastors that followed him. Some more than others, but enjoyed them all. And I want to stress that I learned something from each of them. I had no trouble accepting the role of being a Presbyterian.

I will admit I became more committed and felt more at home when I decided to become involved with the Church. There is a member in our Church who was on the committee seeking new Elders and Deacons. As she approached me to become one, she explained the differences and told me when they met. I gave it some thought and decided it was time for me to become more committed to our Church. That is when I decided to become an Elder of our Church. I thank Ilene Berg every day for her thinking of me and having the confidence in me to be an Elder.

Once I became an Elder and got more involved in our Church, I met more of our congregation. I love meeting all of our visitors and our members. Both full time members and part-time members. I love when we have children running around on our campus. I pray that a day in the near future we will have this again.

The reason I am relating my story, is hopefully to inspire others to get involved. FHPC means so much to me and I can not imagine not being here. 

### **Library Footnotes**

#### The Hiding Place by Corrie Ten Boom

In 1971 at the age of 79, Corrie wrote her famous book the *Hiding Place* about her life story during World War II.

Reading her book, I learned important lessons of **trust**, **hope**, **obedience**, **service** and **forgiveness**, and what it

means to walk as a child of the light. I discovered the heart of a woman who gave herself wholly to Jesus, and when you read her story, you can find the strength and encouragement to live your own life with Corrie's brand of faith and love.

Corrie ten Boom was born on April 15, 1892 in Haarlem, Netherlands. She was the youngest child of Casper ten Boom a jeweler and watch maker. The family lived in the apartment above her father's little shop. Corrie trained to be a watchmaker and in 1922 at the age of 30 she became the first woman to be licensed as a watchmaker in the Netherlands. She was always busy; she started a youth club for disabled girls, which provided religious instruction and classes in the performing arts, sewing and handcrafts. She and her family were Calvinist Christians in the Dutch Reformed Church and their faith inspired them to serve their society which they did by offering shelter, food and money to those who were in need.

Her father was the most important person in her life and his love and guidance helped her through many a hard time. She never married but did have a boyfriend who jilted her. She was devastated. But her father gave her this advice...

They were not well off by any means.

"Do you know what hurts so very much? Its love. Love is the strongest force in the world and when it is blocked that means pain. There are two things we can do when this happens. We can kill the love so that it stops hurting. But then of course part of us dies too. Or we can ask God to open up another route for that love to travel. Whenever we cannot love in the old human way, God gives us the perfect way..."

Her father told her, "Some knowledge is too heavy...you cannot bear it...your Father in heaven will carry it until you are able." All his guidance prepared Corrie for what was to come.

In May 1940 when Corrie was 48 years old, the Germans invaded the Netherlands. One of their restrictions was the banning of Corrie's youth club. Then a woman came to their home asking for help. There was no choice for them and they said of course even though the police headquarters was only half a block away. Corrie's father said, "in this household, God's people are always welcome." The family then became very active in the Dutch underground, hiding refugees and honoring the Jewish Sabbath.

The refugee work that Corrie and her sister did brought them to the attention of the Dutch Resistance and so they sent an architect to their home to build a secret room with an alert buzzer to warn the refugees to get into the room as quickly as possible. The tiny, secret room was in Corrie's bedroom behind a false wall and could hold 6 people. There were regular

security sweeps through the neighborhood, and everyone knew what to do in mere seconds.

Because of wartime shortages food was scarce and every non-Jewish Dutch person received a ration card, the requirement for obtaining weekly food rations. Through her charitable work, Corrie knew a man, a civil servant who was now in charge of the local ration card office. She went to his house one evening and when he asked how many ration cards she needed, instead of saying five for the members of her family, astonishingly, she said one hundred! He gave them to her and she provided cards to every Jewish person she met. She

became more active in the resistance movement overseeing a network for smuggling Jews to safe places. It is estimated that around 800 Jews were saved by Corrie's efforts.

On Feb 28, 1944 when Corrie was 52, a Dutch informant told the Nazis about the ten Boom's work. The entire family was arrested with about 30 other people who were in the house that day! But 6 people managed to get into the secret room that was not found. Because Resistance materials and extra ration cards were found in the home, the family...Corrie, her sister Betsie and father Casper were sent to prison. Fortunately, the people in the secret room were released after 3 days and sent on in the safe network. Her father Casper, aged 84 at that time, died in prison 10 days later. Corrie was initially in solitary confinement and after 3 months, she was taken to her first hearing. At her trial Corrie spoke about her work with mental disabilities. The Nazi lieutenant scoffed at her work, and she said, "in the eyes of God, a mentally disabled person might be more valuable than a watchmaker or a lieutenant."

Ultimately, Corrie and her sister Betsie were sent to Ravensbrueck concentration camp in Germany. There they held worship services using a Bible they had smuggled in. The two sisters started discussing plans for founding a place of healing after the war. Unfortunately, Betsie died on Dec 16, 1944 at the age of 59. Before she died she told Corrie, "there is no pit so deep that God is not deeper still." Twelve days later Corrie was released because of a clerical error and a week later all the women in her age group were sent to the gas chambers. ... Continued on page 17....

### **MEET OUR MUSICIANS**

I was born into a family of musicians. Dad and Mother were members of a Baptist Church in Coatsville, MO. Within the church Dad directed the choir and sang bass within a quartet. Mother played the piano and after brothers Lowell and Lyle were born, they both sat on the piano bench one on each side of Mother.

After my sister Lorene and I were old enough to do the "Supper" dishes (in those days the meals were referred to as Breakfast, Dinner and Supper) we would sing songs of the current day, such as Bing Crosby tunes, Lorene on the melody (she could always remember the words) and I would harmonize. All three brothers, Lowell, Lyle & Loran played the guitar plus other string instruments. Mother could also play the guitar. Lowell could play the piano "by ear." He did not need written music in front of him. I also play the piano but nothing like my mother or brother could play.

Loran has written and recorded a number of songs. All of us have sung in quartets, choruses, choirs, done solos, sung in groups and barbershop groups. Years ago, Mothers sister,

Ollie sang and played the guitar on the KMA Radio Station in Shenandoah, Iowa. I have formed several quartets during my musical journey.

Music has been a major part of my life. In high school I sang in a quartet, Girls Glee club and Mixed Chorus but the high-light of my musical career was singing with the Sweet Adelines. For 28 years I sang bass in Sweet Adelines group in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. Sweet Adelines is an international organization founded in 1945 in Tulsa, Oklahoma, that started

as a small group of women who loved to sing. Since then, it has evolved into an organization that spans the globe and now consists of nearly 21,000 women.

Barbershop singing is a unique art form of unaccompanied vocal music created from four different voice parts that beautifully blend into one chord, one of the trickiest yet

most rewarding accomplishments of a vocal ensemble. To this day, I miss this style of music. While in Sweet Adelines, my group of about 60 ladies competed and won regional competitions which allowed us to compete internationally. Places we competed were: Detroit, St. Louis,



#### **Fiction**



The Lincoln Highway, Amor Towles. After serving fifteen months in a juvenile work farm for attempted manslaughter, eighteen-year-old Emmett Watson finds that his parents are gone. He plans to take his little brother Billy to California to start a new life. Their journey is sidetracked by two friends from the work farm. They

end up in New York City looking for that new life in various ways.



**State of Terror**, Hillary Clinton, Louise Penny. The newly sworn in president surprisingly appoints a political enemy for the vital position of secretary of state thus silencing one of his harshest critics. A series of warnings about terrorist attacks draws her into world travel and intrigue.




The Personal Librarian, Marie Benedict, Victoria Christopher Murray. In her twenties, Belle da Costa Greene is hired by J. P. Morgan to curate a collection of rare manuscripts, books, and artwork for his newly built Pierpont Morgan Library. Belle becomes a fixture in New York City society and one of the most powerful people in the art and book world. However, she

has a secret she must protect at all costs.




When Stars are Scattered, A Graphic Novel, Victoria Jamieson. Omar and his younger brother, Hassan, have spent most of their lives in a refugee camp in Kenya. Life is hard there with very little food and no access to the medical care that Hassan needs.



The Book Woman's Daughter, Kim Richardson. The daughter of the famed blue-skinned, Troublesome Creek packhorse librarian, Honey and her family have been hiding from the law all her life. But when her mother and father are imprisoned, she realizes she must fight to stay free. Picking up her mother's old packhorse

library route, Honey begins to deliver books to the remote hollers of Appalachia, braving the dangers and rejoicing with those who enjoy books.



Milk Without Honey, Lorene Hoover. Young Ruth Ann is bewildered when her parents lose their land and the bungalow she grew up in, sending her parents from one rented farmhouse to the next in hopes of finding a new home and work that sustains them. Her mother gets tired of the constant moving and poverty and moves to

town taking the children with her.



#### Nonfiction

Braiding Sweet Grass, Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants, Robin Wall Kimmerer. A trained botanist and a member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, Kimmerer embraces the notion that plants and animals are our oldest teachers. She brings these two parts of

her life together to acknowledge and celebrate our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world.



H is for Hawk, Helen McDonald. The memoir of a woman who adopted and raised one of nature's most vicious predators is full of emotion and danger. Fierce and feral, her goshawk Mabel's temperament mirrors Helen's own state of grief after her father's death, and together raptor and human discover the

pain and beauty of being alive.



The Spy and the Traitor, Ben Macintyre. The spy is a Russian KGB officer who was stationed in Britain during the 1970's who then became a spy for Great Britain's M16. The British eventually evacuated him from Russia. The deceit and loyalty and bravery in living two lives, both of them deadly dangerous, is spellbinding.




Wastelands, Corban Addison. The coastal plain of North Carolina is home to a close-knit, rural community that for more than a generation has battled the polluting practices of large-scale farming in its own backyard. Local residents, led by dedicated lawyers, filed a lawsuit against one of the world's most power-

ful companies and won.



The Puma Years, Laura Coleman. A young woman moves to a wild animal rescue in Bolivia where she is assigned to take care of a puma who has been rescued. It is astonishing how the two of them bond, spending time taking walks, sitting by a river and braving all the irritants and dangers in a deep jungle.



River of the Gods, Genius, Courage, and Betrayal in the Search for the Source of the Nile, Candace Mallard. Richard Burton and John Hanning Speke were sent by the Royal Geographical Society to find the source of the Nile. From the start the two men clashed. They would endure tremendous hardships, illness, and constant setbacks.



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#### Death doesn't win

In the final hours of 2021, a wildfire near Boulder, Colorado, destroyed 1,000 homes, including one belonging to Pastor Bill Stephens. His family, out of town at the time, lost all their possessions. After months of feeling buried in debris, insurance paperwork and mourning, Stephens decided that Easter 2022 would mark a fresh start.

During worship that morning, the pastor shared a photo of vibrant daffodils emerging on his charred property. Burned remnants were visible in the background, just as Easter's backdrop includes the pain and death of Good Friday. But the empty tomb in Easter's foreground means death won't win, reminded Stephens. Even when earthly life "isn't all daffodils," we have hope and eternal life through Jesus.



Easter reveals that God will "give us the joy, and it's going to be in the heart of pain that we go through as well," added the pastor. "And that just makes me draw closer to God."

After the war Corrie returned to the Netherlands and set up a rehabilitation center. The refuge housed concentration camp survivors and until 1950 exclusively sheltered jobless Dutch who had collaborated with the Germans. Corrie went on to travel the world as a public speaker appearing in more than 60 countries. She wrote many books during this time. Her message was of forgiveness, hope, love and salvation through the saving grace of Jesus Christ.

As a public speaker some of her famous quotes...

"...worry does not empty tomorrow of its sorrow but empties today of its strength..."

"Happiness isn't something that depends on our surroundings...It's something we make inside ourselves." "Forgiveness is an act of the will, and the will can function regardless of the temperature of the heart."

"The message that God forgives has a prior condition: **that we forgive those who have injured us**. 'If you do not forgive men their trespasses,' Jesus says, 'neither will your Father in heaven forgive your trespasses.'"

Corrie died on her birthday at age 91.
