





The Contemporary Christian

Instructor Dr. Bob Simmons, Pastor

"The Contemporary Chris-

tian" is a series of seven courses most of which are 4 to 6 weeks in length. The purpose of these studies is to build a strong and firm foundation for the Christian Faith.

We completed the first course, "What is the Gospel?" on August 9. We began the second course, "What is a Disciple?" on August 30. This second course is now closed to new students, but we are taking registrations for the third course, "Who is Jesus?" that is scheduled to begin October 4.

The class meets each Wednesday at 10:00 a.m.in the Fireside Room and 6:00 p.m.in the Fellowship Center. We normally take a one-week break between courses. The only cost is for the course book (normally around \$15). Each class meets for one hour.

Who, me? Yes, you!

The Bible is filled with people who don't feel up to the challenge of serving God, speaking for God or leading his people. But God always knows what he's doing. Pastor Haviland Houston issues this challenge: "When you are hesitant to act, or feel a failure of nerve coming on, when courage lags, or even if laziness and the 'I don't care' blues get you down, may the words of Mordecai to Esther burn in your hearts and minds: 'And who knows whether you have not come to the kingdom for such a time as this?"" (See Esther 4:14.)

Max Lucado offers a similar reminder in *You Were Made for This Moment*. "God always has his person," he writes, also citing the book of Esther. "When we feel as though everything is falling apart, God is working in our midst, causing everything to fall into place. He is the King of quiet providence, and he invites you and me to partner with him in his work."

Lucado continues: "God has a Joseph for every famine and a David for every Goliath. When his people need rescuing, God calls a Rahab into service. When a baby Moses needs a mama, God prompts an Egyptian princess to have compassion. He always has his person. He had someone in the story of Esther. And in your story he has you."



Follow God's Song

In Max Lucado's The Song of the King (Crossway Books), three knights long to marry a princess, so her father arranges a contest. Suitors must travel through a dark forest full of frightening creatures. Each suitor may select one travel partner.

One suitor selects the princess's brother, who displays an ivory flute, one of only two in the kingdom; the other flute is his father's. The flutes play the same song. "The king will play from the castle wall," the prince says. "Follow his song, and you will find the castle."



How did the winning suitor avoid getting confused by creatures who imitated the king's song? "I knew ... only one ... could play the song as you do," he tells the king. "So I asked [the prince] to travel with me. As we journeyed, he played. I learned your song so well that though a thousand false flutes tried to hide your music, I could still hear you."

God's song is love, and his Son, Jesus, plays it, too. When Jesus is our companion through life's darkness and confusion, he'll lead us safely to our heavenly King.

Meet Our Musicians

My family had an upright piano, so at age 5 I started piano lessons from a teacher who came to our house. A couple of years later I started violin lessons. (Our grandfather had given us an old violin which had previously belonged to a distant relative.)

Growing up in Denver, the public schools I attended had excellent music programs, and my grade school music teacher was like a mother to me. I loved singing in the choir she directed, and also playing the violin in her small school orchestra. My sister Marilyn, who was two years older than I, was also learning to play the piano and violin. When I was about ten years old, she and I gave a recital at our home for friends and neighbors. One of us would play piano to accompany the other on the violin, and then we would play piano solos and duets.

My father's sister lived nearby. She had a green thumb and her garden was full of flowers all summer long. Marilyn and I would fill our little red wagon with tin cans full of water and our aunt's flowers, and go door to door in our neighborhood selling bouquets for 25 cents each. In four summers we netted enough to buy us each a better violin than Grandad's old one. I ended up with a Stanley, made in Massachusetts in 1952 (then about \$500.)

In junior high and high school, I played second chair in the first violin section of the orchestra. In addition, in high school I was accepted into the all-city orchestra and then into the all-state orchestra. I contemplated pursuing a nursing career after graduation, but I had a limited science background because there was always a conflict in the school schedules between the orchestra periods and the chemistry and physics classes. So I eventually became a music major at the University of Colorado in Boulder.

That lasted for a year, because I met Jerry (then a sophomore) at CU and we were married in the middle of my second year of college. He was hoping to graduate and then attend law school, so while he continued his studies, I went to work for the university newspaper and the Boulder Daily Camera newspaper as a teletype setter operator and proof reader. In California a few years later, after I had continued this same type of work at the Hollywood Citizen News and the Los Angeles Daily Journal, Jerry graduated number one in his law school class at UCLA.

Thereafter, when our son and daughter were in school, I gave music lessons to a few of the children in the neighborhood, and then returned to my college studies in Los Angeles, earning a master's degree in speech therapy.

After we moved to Fountain Hills, Jerry rewarded me by buying me a chance to direct one selection (Sousa's Stars and Stripes Forever) played by the Phoenix Symphony in their concert at Fountain Park on May 7, 2000. What a thrill!

And a few years later I accompanied the Fountain Hills high school choir on piano when they rehearsed, and then helped to chaperone them to New York City to sing in a competition at the Lincoln Center.

Throughout life, I have enjoyed singing in various church choirs. I have found that music gives me great comfort and soothes my spirit. I have met some wonderful directors and choir members. And it is a great blessing to be part of the choir at FHPC, under Debbie's direction.

Library Footnotes

Earlier this year when Mary Alice Bivens relocated from Fountain Hills to Scottsdale, she generously donated about six boxes of books to our church. She and her husband John had accumulated them over the years in their own home library. They were particularly interested in the Middle East, so we now have a lot of good additional resources in the church Library dealing with that part of the world. As Carol Fuls and I were processing some of the books, we found a message written by John to friends about 11 years ago inside the book Son of Hamas. I asked Mary Alice for permission to print the message, using it as a book review for the church newsletter, which was granted. Following is John's message to friends which he probably wrote about ten years ago and it is still very timely:

A friend of ours gave us a book for Christmas, knowing of our interest and passion for peace in the Middle East. I have just finished reading it. The book, on the New York Times bestseller list, is Son of Hamas written by Mosab Hassan Yousef. The author is the son of Sheikh Hassan Yousef, a founding leader of Hamas, internationally recognized as a terrorist organization and responsible for suicide bombings and other deadly attacks against Israel.

The book tells the true story of a Hamas insider who rejected his violent environment and how he embraced the teachings of Jesus to show the world a way to peace. It provides tremendous insight not only to Hamas but also to Islam. I strongly recommend it to those of you who dare to explore the roots of terror, intrigue, religion – Islam and Christianity, and relationships.

I would like to share a couple of excerpts from the book:

"I tell my story as ell to let the Israeli people know that there is hope. If I, the son of a terrorist organization dedicated to the extinction of Israel, can reach a point where I not only learned to love the Jewish people but risked my life for them, there is a light of hope.

My story holds a message for Christians too. We must learn from the sorrows of my people, who carry a heavy burden trying to work their way into God's favor. We have to get beyond the religious rules we make for ourselves. Instead, we must love people – on all sides of the world- unconditionally. If we are going to represent Jesus to the world, we have to live his message of love."

He also shares his observations about the church:

"I am sometimes disappointed in the church, especially here in the West. I am eager for a new generation to lead it and recognize their responsibility toward the other side of the world and the major problems we are facing, like the problem of Islam. We have huge responsibilities as Christians, and the problems look controversial, but we can't back down just to be "politically correct." I don't know why it's so easy for us as followers of Jesus Christ to understand the real nature of Islam and to speak the truth about it, and yet do nothing about it, or do something too late for it to matter. The church, it seems, is ready to act after everybody else has started to act, and that's not how it should be." - John Bivens

Some families celebrate "baptism birthdays" (anniversaries) by lighting candles, sharing scripture and prayer, perhaps looking at photos and recounting stories of that milestone event that marked the beginning of their faith life.

On a birthday, said Nouwen, "we lift someone up and let everyone say, 'We love you." In baptism, God lifts us to his very heart and declares, "You are my precious child. I love you."


