#### Time

The Benedictines are credited with inventing the clock during the 12th and 13th century. Prior to

that, the bells pealed in the monasteries -- not to mark the hour, but to call the monks to prayer. The Benedictines were so dedicated to regular and precise devotions to God that they employed resources to mechanize the bells and eventually developed the clock like what we know today.

Our society has become so dependent on the clock that we forget that time is a gift from God, a valuable and precious commodity which cannot be replaced. Back in the day, employers offered "Time Management" classes and provide "Day Planners" to efficiently manage time and effectively account for tasks and responsibilities. Today, our smartphone or smartwatch dings or buzzes to tell us what we need to do, where to be and when. Yet despite our attention to time, we often neglect to plan time to relax or rest.

We should take a lesson from God. On the seventh day he rested. We might think He deserved the rest after creating the universe, but we know God has unlimited fortitude. It is us mortals who are exhausted and stressed out after the work week or other commitments. Ironically, in those Day Planners, Saturday and Sunday shared one page, symbolically limiting our allotted time to rest and to recharge for what is to come ahead.

It is essential to find a balance between productivity and making time to rest and nurture our spiritual well-being. We could ask Alexa to schedule a reminder for prayer or ask her to read us a Bible passage or devotion. She will – I have asked!

Admittedly my smartphone is set to wake me each Sunday and often regardless of when I rise, I am still rushing to church, but my clock stops when I arrive. The blessings of music, prayer and more so, the powerful and insightful sermons, is divine sustenance. Time is of no consequence; it is the essence of the message—the spiritual truths, guidance, and wisdom, which brings me closer to my faith and beliefs.

We all have commitments, even on Sunday. Yet God has his own schedule for us, and it is not bound by the constraints of time. He has no clock, no planner or smart device. He gives us a gift of time to take a rest from our lives and to focus on our relationship with Him.

What a blessing to enter the house of God, a place where we can put aside our worries and distractions, close our minds to the ticking clock and celebrate all that He is and all that He has done. Our host, the Lord Almighty, certainly deserves our full attention.

Although August income fell short of August expenses, YTD we are in a good financial position. In August we had to replace two older air conditioners in the amount of \$18,500. We have a Capital Reserve account set up to cover these type of capital expenditures. The Capital Reserve account was first set up when we started the Capital Campaign. However, the Capital Reserve account needs to be replenished. We have replaced all of the air conditioners in the last several years, as expected, but expenses in maintaining the air conditioners are ongoing. Compressors are taxed with the hot summer days, leaks occur requiring expensive replacement of freon, etc. The Capital Reserve account is

also needed for other major expenditures, such as roof repairs, water heaters, lighting. In addition, Buildings & Grounds (B&G) is in the process of updating the Fellowship Kitchen. Kitchen Appliances are the originals from when the Fellowship Center was first built, counter tops need replacing to bring the kitchen into required sanitary standards. We appreciate your keeping up with your pledges and contributions They are necessary in keeping up with our operating expenses and also allowing the church to continue various missions and programs.

The Shift The new year-long approach to stewardship requires a SHIFT in the way we think, talk, and act about the meaning of STEWARDSHIP.


Stewardship is about—

#### **FHPC Promotes Spiritual Development**



#### Transitional pastor focuses on mentorship

After the retirement of former Pastor Bill Good, the Fountain Hills Presbyterian Church (FHPC) tapped The Rev. Dr. Bob Simmons to take over as transitional pastor.

While the church searches for a new permanent pastor, Simmons has focused on the spiritual development of church members, mentoring the youth and filling any pressing needs before a new church leader is chosen.

"My goal is to try to get the church at a place where this time next year, they either have found someone or they're doing a diligent search," Simmons said, whose original contract called for one year with an option to renew for an additional year as transitional pastor.

Simmons made it clear that while he is not in a hurry to leave his post, he understands that the church needs a permanent pastor to lead them into the foreseeable future.

"Early on in my training in seminary, I'll never forget a professor that said to me, 'Every church needs to earn the right to be in their tions, teaching Bible studies, leadcommunity.' And how do you do that? Well, by meeting some needs," Simmons said.

Those needs include initiatives such as providing a grief support group for those who have lost loved ones, offering tutoring classes for the youth and – given the musical emphasis of the church – possibly offering music lessons to those interested in taking on a new challenge.

#### **Ministerial internship**

A new initiative that Simmons has undertaken during FHPC's transitionary period is in the form of a ministerial internship.

Through A Covenant Order of Evangelical Presbyterians (ECO), this year-long internship program invites qualified pastoral interns in the process of ordination into the inner workings of a church to learn, grow and lead some of the many church functions.

Joining Simmons is Pastoral Intern Lisa McFarland, who has hit the ground running since joining FHPC in January.

"One of the blessings about this particular ordination program is that you have people supporting you from the national level from the local Presbyterian level all the way down to the local church, rooting you on and helping you get through the process," McFarland said.

As a pastoral intern, McFarland is in many ways filling the role of assistant pastor: Performing visitaing worship services and meeting with parishioners regularly. McFarland said her goal at the end of the internship is to become ordained and to pastor a church that is kind toward the marginalized.

"Anyone who has been made to feel like they don't belong in the church, who has been on the margins, outcast, hurt by the church... these are all the things that are really dear to my heart," she said. "My desire is to develop a church community where these people, which are many, have the opportunity to experience church differently."

#### Women in clergy

McFarland completed her seminary in 2018 with a master's degree in counseling from Westminster Theological Seminary in Glenside, Pa. For years, she was involved with churches that did not support the ordination of women before joining the Presbyterian Church. Since 1956, the Presbyterian denomination in the United States ordained its first female minister, and Simmons is eager to support McFarland in her journey.

"We Presbyterians believe that God does not call us to serve him on the basis of gender but on gift and passion," Simmons said. "God looks beyond the gender and says, 'You got a passion to tell the story about Jesus? Go do it.""

#### **School Supplies**







The Center for Biblical Studies is the new

"brainchild" of Pastor Bob that is offering a series of seven courses on the topic, "The Contemporary Christian." Two courses, "What is the Gospel?" and "What is a Disciple?", have been completed by over 35 persons. The third course, "Can We Trust the Bible?" begins October 4th, at 10:00 am in the Fireside room, and 6:00 pm in the Fellowship Center.

These courses provide an opportunity for people to deepen their understanding of their Christian Faith. The mission of our church is, "Love God, Love People, Make Disciples." Since a disciple is a pupil, learner, or student of Jesus, these courses provide the means to deepen our discipleship and to be better equipped to live and share our faith. 


In the Likeness of God by Dr. Paul Brand and Philip Yancey

Our Wednesday Bible study classes at FHPC have just wrapped up John Stott's book The Disciple, the second in a series of seven courses. While reading the first chapter, I noticed a footnote referencing In the Likeness of God, which is actually two books

written by Dr. Paul Brand and Philip Yancey – Fearfully and Wonderfully Made followed by In His Image. Although I read them over 30 years ago, they impressed me so much both now and then that I feel compelled to encourage others to check this combined edition out from our church Library.

Dr. Brand spent most of his medical career in India working among fifteen million victims of leprosy. To him, these are among the most neglected people on earth; not nobodies, but people made in God's image. He devoted his life to trying to honor that image. In the late 1940s, he became the first surgeon in the world to use reconstructive surgery to correct the deformities of leprosy in the hands and feet. Eventually he established the only leprosy hospital in the USA in Carville, Louisiana. His co-author Philip Yancey has written many widely acclaimed Christian books on his own.

In Fearfully and Wonderfully Made, Dr. Paul Brand and Philip Yancey explore the human body. Join them in a remarkable journey through inner space—a spellbinding world of cells, systems, and chemistry that bears the impress of a still deeper, unseen reality. This Gold medallion Awardwinning book uncovers eternal statements that God has made in the very structure of our bodies, presenting captivating insights into the Body of Christ. Knowledge of the human body sheds light on



the metaphor used more than thirty times in the New Testament – the Body of Christ which is the Church. The Church is comprised of individual members joined to Jesus Christ as Head. The importance of this metaphor and its significance throughout this book is found in I Corinthians 12:12 "The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts: and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So it is with Christ" NIV

The second book, In His Image, continues this approach, but whereas the first placed emphasis on individual cells and the varying roles within the Body, the second focuses more on the connections, the forces uniting and guiding that Body, and the involvement of God Himself. Both books cause the reader to reflect on what it means to be the Body of Christ and created in God's image. You will find it enjoyable and enlightening.


