

"THE VALUES THAT SHAPE US"

In I Samuel 7, Samuel sets up a stone as a tangible reminder of God's faithful provision and deliverance (specifically in this case from the Philistines). Samuel names the stone Ebenezer, which means "stone of help". This name clearly points not to the rock since it wasn't involved in any significant way, but rather points to the Lord, "my rock, my fortress and my deliverer." (2 Sam 22:2, Ps. 18:2). The purpose was that anytime one passed by the Ebenezer stone they would recall Samuel's words; "Thus far the Lord has helped us."

This recollection calls us to look back and remember God's faithfulness in the past. Individually and collectively when we survey life through the rearview mirror we can't

help but see evidence of God's goodness, provision, and grace. FHPC has a rich 51-year history made up of a combination of mountain top and valley experiences, yet through it all the Lord has been a faithful help thus far.

Considering this it is good to pause and give thanks for the provision and grace that has shaped us individually and as FHPC. I invite you to name the blessings and the breakthroughs. In our increasingly urgent world, it is good to be still and enumerate these blessings. I want to praise God for the faithful leadership of Rev. Dr. Bob Simmons as he has guided FHPC through this most recent season of transition.

This recollection also emboldens us to walk forward in faithful confidence into the next chapter of life. Unlike the investment disclaimer, God's faithful provision and goodness are a predicter of His future provision and goodness. Filled with a wider view of God's provision and grace, may we walk confidently into the future together, praying for and striving for the "abundantly far more" (Eph. 3:20)

that God has in store for us.

The congregation at Fountain Hills Presbyterian Church will honor Rev. Dr. Bob Simmons and his wife Jeanette at a catered reception in Fellowship Hall on Sunday, July 27, following their worship service, in honor of his role as transitional pastor for the past three years.

The FHPC congregation recently voted approval of their new pastor, Rev. Jim Rizer and his wife Melissa, when presented by the Pastoral Nominating committee. An experienced pastor, Rev. Rizer will start preaching in Fountain Hills on August 3.

After growing up in the greater Phoenix area, Rev. Rizer moved to Atlanta where he finished high school. It was during this time that Jim first understood God's saving grace through Christ at a Young Life weekend at Windy Gap, NC.

Rizer graduated from Rhodes College in Memphis, TN, with a BA in Economics. After a couple of his friends suggested that he would be a good minister, he returned to the Phoenix area and joined Northminster Presbyterian Church where that pastor served as his guide and mentor.




Women's Bible Study Jeanette Simmons & Janet Scaggs




spectacular view of the **Fountain Park fireworks** from the comfort of our airconditioned hall.

Library Footnotes | Althea Halchuck




Thirteen-year-old Anne Frank, her parents, older sister, and four other people watched Hitler's rise to power in Europe and his persecution of fellow Jews. Rather than wait for the Germans to deport or force them into work camps like their neighbors and friends, they prepared for the worst, and in July 1942, they went into hiding. Although German, they lived in Amsterdam, where Anne's

father and his partner owned a spice packing warehouse. They prepared a living area in the "secret annex" behind the factory for their eventual hideaway. While in hiding, Anne kept a diary, providing a firsthand account of life under Nazi occupation. The diary, a gift for her 13th birthday, offers vivid observations and a unique and intimate perspective on the daily struggles, fears, and hopes of those in hiding. Cut off from the outside world, except for a radio and helpful friends, they endured hunger, boredom, the strain of close quarters, and the constant fear of discovery and death. They listened to the BBC and followed the war's progress; always hopeful it would end soon. Anne describes the radio as a "courage-keeping source." At times thoughtful, poignant, and even amusing, her writing offers a remarkable window into the strength and vulnerability of the persecuted Jews. Her work has significantly impacted how people perceive the Holocaust and is a powerful reminder of the horrors of war and an eloquent testament to the human spirit. The irony is that Anne wanted to become an author, and it is one of the most widely read books in the world. Anne's final entry is dated August 1, 1944. Three days later, the Gestapo discovered the secret annex, arrested Anne and her companions, and shipped them to concentration camps. Otto Frank, Anne's father, was the only survivor. He recovered Anne's diary pages from his factory friends and published them in 1947 as "The Diary of a Young Girl." We know it as "The Diary of Anne Frank," a required reading for most middle school students.

The rise of antisemitism and the murder of a young Jewish

couple in May 2025 prompted me to display library books that dealt with Nazism, the Holocaust, and the brave people who worked in the Resistance to defeat the Germans. Our church library has a wide selection of such books, but one book was missing: Anne Frank's Diary. I purchased *The Diary of a Young Girl: The Definitive Edition* to add to our collection. There are three versions of the diary, and this edition captures all three, including pages Otto left out because he did not think them "appropriate" to publish due to Anne writing about her budding sexuality. This version is must-read!

Other books that should not be missed include both historical and non-fiction. They tell gripping stories of evil in the world and how some people survived to tell their tales of heroism and resistance. Bonhoeffer: Pastor, Martyr,




Prophet, Spy is one such book. Dietrich Bonhoeffer was a German Lutheran pastor and staunch anti-Nazi dissident. Like the Apostle Peter, he wrote from prison and was hanged in April 1945 during the collapse of the Nazi regime.

Corrie ten Boom became a heroine of the Dutch Resistance and a survivor of Hitler's concentration

camps. The Hiding Place is the story of her family hiding, feeding, and transporting some 800 Jews hunted by the

Gestapo out of the country. Those who claim the Holocaust never existed would be advised to read any one of these great books.


