NICHE EXPANSION COMPLETED

The FHPC Columbarium was dedicated in 1990, following an ancient custom of burying the deceased near a home church. It is

a final resting place for the cremains of many of our church members and friends. It is located in the shadow of the Memorial Bell Tower near the entrance to the Sanctuary and shaded by mesquite and olive trees. High above, the Carillon rings out beautiful and cherished hymns. A lovely fountain, beautiful flora, and memorial benches within the Columbarium offer a peaceful and sacred setting for reflection, prayer, and meditation. Surrounding the Columbarium is our Biblical Garden, which features plantings mentioned in the Bible.

The Columbarium and Biblical Garden are managed by the Columbarium Trustees, a committee of our church corporation elected by the Congregation for three-year terms. Current Trustees are Matt Jefferson (Chair), Althea

Halchuck, George Holtan, Dawn Lau, and our latest member, Arlene Stewart. FHPC does not fund or supplement Columbarium in any way; it is fully self-sustaining. Management is provided solely by niche subscriptions, memorial plaque reservations, donations, and volunteer participation. A trust fund, managed by the Trustees, ensures proper maintenance and perpetual care of the Columbarium. The Columbarium is not restricted to church members but is available to anyone with the Trustees' prior approval. The subscription fee of \$1,250 includes the bronze nameplate created at the time of interment, a Veteran's medallion, and maintenance.

Initially, there were 276 niches, but by the Fall of 2024, only six remained. So, the (cont. pg. 7)

Columbarium Report *(continued)*

Trustees voted to expand by adding 32 niches. Our expansion goals were to maximize the number of niches, minimize the footprint, maintain the quality, and make it affordable. We received three bids for various designs and locations on the campus. After much deliberation, the Trustees approved the bid for 32 niches from the original niche provider, Matthews' Mausoleum. The new niche expansion



was completed in early 2025, and the new niches were located directly across from Section "A," in Section "D," creating a mirror image of the existing wall.

This project had many moving parts and helpers, including former Trustee Bob Lull, who served as construction manager, and Jack Morris, a long-time Trustee who served throughout the completion. Work included removing a shade tree and some

shrubs, and masonry work to form a structure for inserting the bank of 32 niches. A tile company encased the new niches, identical to those in Section "A." Church member Mike Stanton arranged transport of the niches from the Mathews factory in Pennsylvania to Phoenix for storage and delivery to



the church, and he donated the costs. Bill and Helen Quiqley generously covered the cost of replacing the mesquite tree with a new olive tree. We adhered to our list of goals and stayed under budget.

Book Review | Althea Halchuck

A Shepherd Looks at Psalm 23

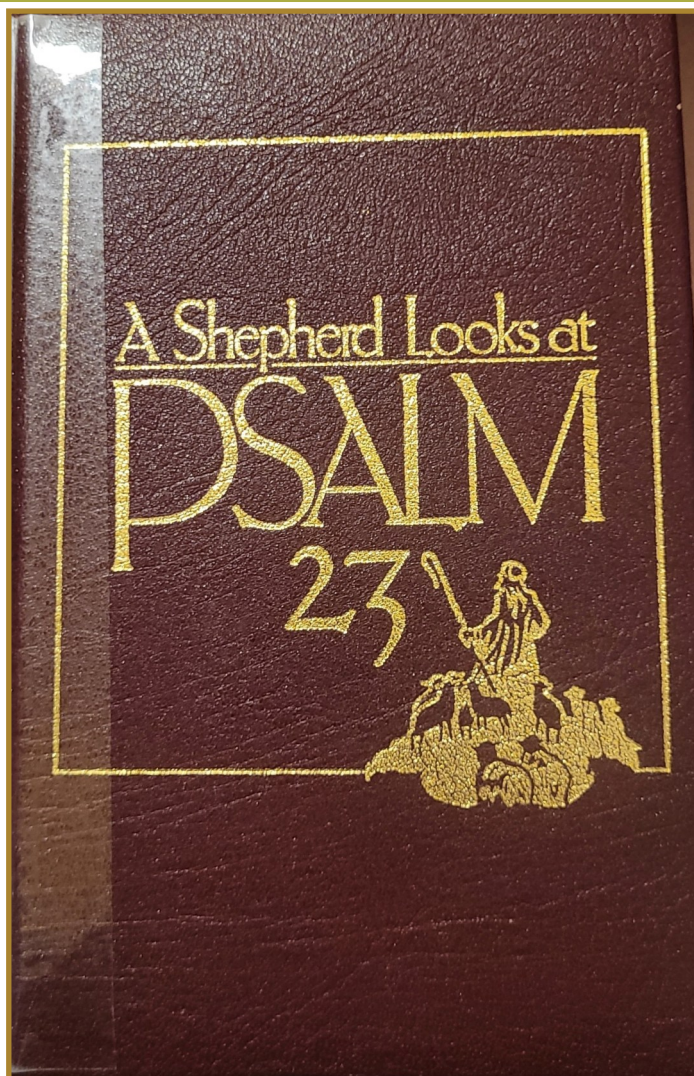

Two Versions: 1970 and 1999

Note: This article was first published in 2024 and is back by popular demand.

The 23rd Psalm is one of the most famous passages of Scripture. Many have memorized it, and Christians almost always read it at memorial and graveside services. I grew up with the King James version, and that's one of the reasons I was drawn to W. Phillip Keller's *A Shepherd Looks at Psalm 23*. David is the author of the 23rd Psalm, and he wrote it speaking as a sheep, or as one of the flock. There are two versions of this book in our library. The 1970 version is bound in brown leather and printed in black and white with charming etch-like illustrations by Robert Doares. The 1999 revised version has full-color illustrations, but I feel it lacks the simple charm of the earlier version.

The twelve chapters begin with "The Lord is My Shepard" and end with "I Will Dwell in the House of the Lord Forever." Phrase by phrase, Keller discusses the 23rd Psalm and draws on his eight years of experience as a sheep rancher in British Columbia to illustrate how God is the Good Shepherd there to protect and guide us through difficult terrain. We are His mere sheep, dependent on Him for our every need. Keller draws on his insights from his shepherding days to show parallels between our lives as Christians and our loving Shepherd, who cares for each of



us and never lets even one of his sheep go astray. ***“God and man are those of a father to his children and a shepherd to his sheep.”***

Follow the author's admonition for the “reader to approach the pages with an open mind and unbiased spirit. If he does, fresh truth and exciting glimpses of God’s care and concerns for him will flood over his being.” This is an amazing book from both a spiritual and educational perspective. Keller cleverly weaves his knowledge and experience into each chapter. You will learn everything you need to know

about the “sheep world” and how the shepherd must be proactive with his flock to maintain their security. As with sheep, there are many obstacles in life to overcome, and it is up to us to follow our Shepherd to avoid its ruts, pitfalls, and hazards. “Always follow the Shepherd” is good advice for sheep and Christians alike.

Here are some relevant quotes:

“Sheep do not ‘just take care of themselves.’ They require endless attention



and meticulous care. From early dawn until late at night, this utterly selfless Shepherd is alert to the welfare of his flock. For him, there is no greater reward, no deeper satisfaction, than seeing his sheep contented, well-fed, safe, and flourishing under his care.”

“It is no mere whim on God’s part to call us sheep. Our behavior patterns and life habits are so much like those of sheep that it is well-nigh embarrassing. Our mass mind (or mob instincts), our fears and timidity, our stubbornness and stupidity, and our perverse habits are all parallels of profound importance.”

“I came to realize that nothing so quieted and reassured the sheep as to see me in the field. The presence of their master, owner and protector put them at ease as nothing else could. When my eyes are on my Master, they are not on those around me. This is a place of peace.”

There is not enough time in a short review to present much detail. You must experience this book for yourself. I guarantee you will never think about the 23rd Psalm (or sheep) in the same way after you read this treasure of a book.
